### Artwork Story

*Don't Give Money to the Arts*, a performance by Tang Da Wu at the inauguration of a major arts festival in 1995, is one of Tang's most iconic works. It addressed pressing issues in the local arts scene at the time in a bold and activist manner. In the festival, the artist approached then-President Ong Teng Cheong, asked him for permission to put on the jacket, then presented him with a letter, which read: "I am an artist. I am important." When asked about the intention behind his performance, the artist explained that he wanted to let the president know that "the wrong kind of art"—presumably the modernist, abstract art displayed in the festival—was being funded.

### Artist's Biography

Tang Da Wu (1943– ) is an iconic figure in the history of contemporary art in Singapore. He works with a wide range of media such as drawing, painting, sculpture, installation and performance art, and is recognised for exploring socio-political and environmental issues through his artworks. In 1988, Tang co-founded The Artists Village, one of Singapore's leading contemporary art collectives. He has exhibited widely at numerous exhibitions over the years, and represented Singapore at the 52nd Venice Biennale in 2007.
