




Two children sketching with pencils, on their visit to National Gallery Singapore

I will be visiting National Gallery Singapore.


This Social Story tells me how to get to the Gallery and what to expect during my visit.



Paintings and sculptures in National Gallery Singapore


National Gallery Singapore is a visual art museum.

I can see paintings, photographs and sculptures from Singapore and Southeast Asia.




Coleman Entrance at National Gallery Singapore

I walk through the Coleman Entrance to enter the Gallery.




Doors closed at Coleman Entrance

The doors swing open by themselves when I walk near them. I wait for the doors to fully open.



Doors open at Coleman Entrance


Once the doors are fully open, I walk across the door mat to enter the Gallery.

When I enter the Gallery, a **Gallery Ambassador** greets me. All Gallery Ambassadors wear a black tie and vest.

A Gallery Ambassador helps to keep artworks and people safe. They know how to handle emergencies. I can talk to them if I need help.

I need a ticket so that I can explore different parts of the Gallery. This is called a "Gallery Pass."

I go to one of these machines to get my Gallery Pass.

Sometimes, there may be many people waiting to get their tickets. I will queue patiently and wait for my turn.

If I am comfortable, I will stick the ticket onto my clothing. If not, the adult I am with can hold on to my ticket for me.

It is important that I keep this sticker with me when I am in the Gallery.

I can also go to the Visitor Services counter to get tickets.

The counter is lit up with white light. It may be bright, especially if it is nighttime or if it is raining outside.

Around the Gallery, I will see people wearing a silver shirt with elbow-length sleeves and long black pants with a gold name tag.

They are Visitor Experience Ambassadors.

They can give me directions to different places in the Gallery, such as the toilet, lift, Calm Room or exhibition galleries.

In an exhibition gallery, there are some rules to follow.

The rules are meant to keep the artworks safe.

This allows all visitors to enjoy the art in the Gallery!

I will follow these rules in the Gallery.



Walk slowly

This way, you will not miss anything.



Nibble-free

Help us keep our museum clean and hygienic – no food or drink in the galleries.



Talk softly

Have a quiet conversation with your friend, or with the art.



Hands-free

Sweat and oil from our hands cause damage to artworks so we must not touch the artworks. Some artworks can be touched but please ask our Gallery staff first.



When it gets crowded

Be extra careful of the artworks around you and make room for



Flash-free

Camera flash and bright lights cause damage to artworks. Remember to turn off your camera flash before taking any photographs.

I will walk slowly and talk softly.


I will only drink plain water.

When I take photos, I will not use the camera flash function.

I can only use a pencil to write or draw in the Gallery.



A black line on the gallery floor reminds visitors to not stand too close to the artworks

In the exhibition gallery, I see black lines or barriers in front of the artworks.

I stay behind these lines.

This keeps both me and the artwork safe.


If the Gallery is too loud, or crowded, I can go to the Calm Room at Basement 1 to calm down.

The Calm Room is a clean, quiet space, where I can sit for as long as I need to relax and prepare to explore the Gallery.

The adult I am with can follow me into the Calm Room too.
